


Tales from the Shadowhunter Academy By Cassandra Clare, Sarah Rees Brennan, Maureen Johson, Robin Wasserman

Tales from the Shadowhunter Academy is one of the many fantastic books that allow readers to dive deep into the Shadowhunter Universe. Written by Cassandra Clare, with assistance from many other talented authors, Tales from the Shadowhunter Academy tells the story of former vampire Simon Lewis as he struggles to discover who he is in the academy- a school for teenagers wishing to become shadowhunters. The book is formatted in a series of short stories told by characters from other Cassandra Clare books such as The Mortal Instruments, and The Infernal Devices. These characters are brought into the academy as guest speakers and speak to classes of shadowhunter students.

The reason the short-story format works so well with this book is because as a reader, you are learning along with the other students in the story. When a guest speaker talks to the class, you are put in the same position as everyone else in trying to decipher what the lesson of the story is. In addition to this, the book accurately displays different types of students and how teenagers actually interact with each other day to day. Often times the lessons presented by the speakers relate to interactions happening between students or outside of the school. The short stories also allow a deeper look into characters from other Cassandra Clare novels, which leaves the reader with new perspectives on events that have happened in the past. Overall, the book was a great tale of self-discovery, and it forced the reader to reconsider many of the original opinions they may have had on characters they thought they knew well.

However, this leads to the criticism that anyone who has not read *The Mortal Instruments* or *The Infernal Devices* would most likely be extremely lost when trying to read *Tales from the Shadowhunter Academy*. It is not the type of book that can just be picked up and read without a significant amount of background information, and it should not be the first Cassandra Clare book someone starts if they decide they want to explore the Shadowhunter Universe. If you are looking for a starting point, *The Mortal Instruments* series is a great place to begin.
