for kindergarten; our literacy program which includes a literacy coach and

0:08:42.210,0:08:48.420 A-8 AVID (advancement via individual determination); more and more math support.

0:08:48.420,0:08:52.470 We know that we've been deficient in that area and focusing on literacy and

0:08:52.470,0:08:57.600 we finally have been investing in our math program with math coach and

0:08:57.600,0:09:03.210 academic intervention services across grade levels; adding more college-level

0:09:03.210,0:09:07.860 courses. most recently with SUNY Cobleskill but also through Columbia

0:09:07.860,0:09:11.880 Green Community College and other college courses that are offered through

0:09:11.880,0:09:17.910 Bard College; our Career Development and occupational studies also known as CDOS

0:09:17.910,0:09:22.650 which gives our students another credential besides graduation diploma;

0:09:22.650,0:09:28.530 and opening up many occupational education opportunities. As you know, we

0:09:28.530,0:09:33.780 changed our mantra from Destination Graduation Get on Board when we knew

0:09:33.780,0:09:38.760 that a graduation rate for less than sixty percent needed to be raised

0:09:38.760,0:09:43.080 raised quickly and authentically and we've done that. We now have a graduation

0:09:43.080,0:09:47.640 rate over 80 percent, but we wanted to refocus ourselves on Destination

0:09:47.640,0:09:52.620 Graduation to Occupation, and help students to know the talents and the

parameters to an acceptable level. We have recommendations in the teachers'

contract. It's not something that we have to abide by but it's something that

gives us some parameters, especially when we need to make difficult decisions when

there's a lack of revenue. We always want to build a foundation for future budgets.

As someone that was here as assistant superintendent, when we were through the,

0:12:09.810,0:12:15.480 went through the recession in 2009-10 and we had mass layoffs, I want to say

0:12:15.480,0:12:21.689 about 40 positions in the first year, we had no reserves. We had no assigned fund

0:12:21.689,0:12:27.959 balance to lean on, and we were forced to make layoffs that other districts were

0:12:27.959,0:12:32.639 not needing to do as as quickly as we did. We're in a very fortunate position

0:12:32.639,0:12:38.220 now that we are going through difficult financial times but the financial health

0:12:38.220,0:12:42.990 of the district is no longer in crisis. We are financially healthy and so that

0:12:42.990,0:12:48.329 will make a difference this time as we make decisions. Our goal has always been

0:12:48.329,0:12:52.529 to maintain the fund balance that is recommended by our auditors which is 4%

0:12:52.529,0:12:59.069 of our total budget and also build on reserves for future expenses. I just have

0:12:59.069,0:13:07.220 to learn just like camera here so I can see my screen. Any questions so far?

0:13:07.220,0:13:10.680 So that's our focus. That's our North Star when we're

0:13:10.680,0:13:16.889 building our spending plan. So we always take a good inventory of our district

0:13:16.889,0:13:22.649 staff. Our teaching staff at the elementary school for those of you

0:13:22.649,0:13:27.509 you've seen this slide every year that I've given presentations is we look at 0:13:27.509,0:13:33.059 what our current enrollment is in each grade level K through 5. Where you see

0:13:33.059,0:13:39.389 the SC that stands for self-contained classrooms. Because if we just look at

0:13:39.389,0:13:45.029 the 117 students in our current kindergarten classroom you need to

0:13:45.029,0:13:51.839 deduct 6 students who are off into a special contained classroom for students

0:13:51.839,0:13:57.959 with unique needs. We have seven sections currently with about 16 students 16 to

0:13:57.959,0:14:03.149 18 students in a classroom one of them being our two year kindergarten program

0:14:03.149,0:14:07.920 for students that at risk and our highest needs. And then

0:14:07.920,0:14:14.100 we project we used to project a number of 150 and then it went to 140 for the

0:14:14.100,0:14:19.740 last couple of years we project 130 as an incoming kindergarten class and then

0:14:19.740,0:14:24.870 Kim lets us know how many students are coming to us already pre identified that

0:14:24.870,0:14:29.160 would reduce that number and then we divide across the number of sections to

0:14:29.160,0:14:34.259 keep our class sizes at a reasonable amount also knowing that we need to give

0:14:34.259,0:14:39.360 students individual attention that need it. So we don't know what that 130 will

0:14:39.360,0:14:45.410

be this year. We are of course late with kindergarten registrations because of

0:14:45.410,0:14:49.980 schools being closed. So we're looking into alternatives of how we may be able

0:14:49.980,0:14:54.389 to screen our students. But that number could change and that's why there's an

0:14:54.389,0:14:58.949 asterix there. That kindergarten enrollment is currently estimated. Tt

0:14:58.949,0:15:03.839 includes the two 2-year kindergarten classrooms and we have to monitor that

0:15:03.839,0:15:10.980 total very closely. There are many times when we move a section from kindergarten

0:15:10.980,0:15:15.149 to first grade and then again we move first grade back down to kindergarten,

0:15:15.149,0:15:18.750 but we just don't know at this point how many students will be coming into

0:15:18.750,0:15:23.420 kindergarten, but 130 seems to be a good number to start with.

0:15:23.420,0:15:31.949 So no variance there. In first grade we have two retirements so we do not plan

0:15:31.949,0:15:37.500 on replacing either of them. Our class sizes are acceptable, but where you see

0:15:37.500,0:15:44.010 that section variance - 2, of course we currently have six sections, which would

0:15:44.010,0:15:48.269 mean first grade would go to four sections, but that's not what will happen.

0:15:48.269,0:15:53.579 We don't want to have a large class size in first grade. So we either will move a 0:15:53.579,0:15:59.370 kindergarten teacher up, if enrollment is down in kindergarten, or we need to look

0:15:59.370,0:16:04.550 at our grades 2 - 5 to see where there's flexibility in moving a

0:16:04.550,0:16:10.500 teacher from one of those grade levels down to first grade. So 1st grade will be

0:16:10.500,0:16:15.540 five sections based on the numbers that we currently have and not replacing

0:16:15.540,0:16:22.080 those two teachers. That gives breakage with attrition as well as not

0:16:22.080,0:16:28.860 hiring a first-year teacher. So that gives us the savings as well. I also want

0:16:28.860,0:16:33.810 to call your attention to the non-mandated programs that we have K - 5.

0:16:33.810,0:16:40.770 Universal pre-k is mandated. It's fully funded by the state based on

0:16:40.770,0:16:46.320 previous year's enrollment. I would never as superintendent

0:16:46.320,0:16:51.930 recommend reduction in kindergarten, however kindergarten is not a mandated

0:16:51.930,0:16:57.270 program. I don't have it down here under non-mandated programs because I can't

0:16:57.270,0:17:01.830 even fathom what our system would be like without having our students

0:17:01.830,0:17:07.470 experience UPK and kindergarten as well, but it's something that I need to

0:17:07.470,0:17:12.450 mention when I'm mentioning non-mandated programs K - 5. We have a

0:17:12.450,0:17:16.800 literacy coach that has been in our system for a very long time

0:17:16.800,0:17:22.050 it used to be Mrs. Dolan and now Mrs. Campbell holds that position. So that is

0:17:22.050,0:17:27.209 a non-mandated teacher on special assignment. We also have a math coach

0:17:27.209,0:17:32.070 where we're investing more in our math program and that also is a teacher on

0:17:32.070,0:17:37.440 special assignment. We have computer, which we've had for many a year, It's not

0:17:37.440,0:17:43.050 mandated but it also is utilized in order to provide our teachers with a

0:17:43.050,0:17:49.980 prep. Contractually they must have at least one prep a day and our students

0:17:49.980,0:17:55.080 filtering through music, art, computer allows our teachers to have that period

0:17:55.080,0:18:01.250 of prep. So while it's not mandated, it's essential for the flow of our schedule.

0:18:01.250,0:18:06.780 also our STEAM program, as you know we have project-based learning now and we

0:18:06.780,0:18:11.580 want to continue that. it's been very wonderful to have science and technology

0:18:11.580,0:18:15.750 engineering and math all woven into project-based learning so that is

0:18:15.750,0:18:21.000 something that we have been looking to grow, not to reduce, but that is a non-

0:18:21.000,0:18:26.520

mandated program. As well as the librarian. Librarians are mandated at the

0:18:26.520,0:18:30.279 secondary level but not at the elementary level but again

0:18:30.279,0:18:34.119 is something that helps your schedule to be balanced so that your teachers can

0:18:34.119,0:18:40.960 have their prep. Class size ranges that are in the teachers' contract just as a

0:18:40.960,0:18:47.169 suggestion, is K - 2, no more than 20 no more than 25, and 3 - 6 no

0:18:47.169,0:18:54.849 more than 30 and 25 would be the low end. Now

0:18:54.849,0:18:58.749 we do go under that because these recommendations have been in the

0:18:58.749,0:19:03.159 contract for a very long time. Some of our classrooms can accommodate larger

0:19:03.159,0:19:08.109 classes. Some of them not so much. And in a world where we are heading towards

0:19:08.109,0:19:12.549 social distancing, I'm not really sure what that's going to mean in the future.

0:19:12.549,0:19:17.019 We have to reimagine education as the governor has been telling us and

0:19:17.019,0:19:23.469 there'll be another slide that goes over that in a little more detail. If there's no

0:19:23.469,0:19:27.070 questions I'll move over to the junior high so that you have an idea of what

0:19:27.070,0:19:31.869 our class sizes look like there. Generally in sixth grade,

0:19:31.869,0:19:39.639 we have a six content area rotation,

which gives us approximately 21 students

0:19:39.639,0:19:45.669 in a class. What you see in bright blue there, the writing program, which is

0:19:45.669,0:19:51.849 part of our literacy program and our STEAM program are not mandated. If we

0:19:51.849,0:19:56.080 weren't able to fund that in any given year, and I'm not suggesting that this is

0:19:56.080,0:20:01.330 the year, but if we had to reduce those are the areas that we have to look at

0:20:01.330,0:20:06.549 first. Our non-mandated programs because we cannot cut our mandated programs and

0:20:06.549,0:20:13.719 our special ED, IEP driven instruction. So that would

0:20:13.719,0:20:17.889 increase class sizes if one of those were to be removed. You would move class

0:20:17.889,0:20:24.339 sizes up to at least 25 and knowing what next year we have at least 10 more

0:20:24.339,0:20:27.849 students coming into sixth grade next year, that would put our class sizes

0:20:27.849,0:20:33.489 between 26 and 27. So I just want to give you a frame of reference of how we look

0:20:33.489,0:20:41.559 at our staffing and our class sizes. The other two programs that are not mandated

0:20:41.559,0:20:46.309 are our computer class in seventh and eighth grade and our AVID

0:20:46.309,0:20:52.159 is sixth assignments, so those are teachers that are already in our payroll

0:20:52.159,0:20:56.989

but we give them a sixth assignment as per contract. It saves us from hiring

0:20:56.989,0:21:02.090 another teacher and extra benefits, and they are given a \$10,000 stipend to

0:21:02.090,0:21:07.700 teach a sixth assignment. So these are the things that we have been funding to

0:21:07.700,0:21:15.649 support our junior high school students 6 - 8. High school classes

0:21:15.649,0:21:20.779 are a bit different. As you know our students need to at least have 22

0:21:20.779,0:21:26.359 credits in order to graduate plus their Regents exams. So our class sizes are

0:21:26.359,0:21:31.909 determined by their course requirements for graduation each year, and then what

0:21:31.909,0:21:37.460 their course requests would be for their electives. And we average about 22 to 25

0:21:37.460,0:21:44.450 students in a high school classroom currently. Smaller class sizes are part

0:21:44.450,0:21:50.299 of the contract for safety in PE classes family and consumer science tech science

0:21:50.299,0:21:55.249 labs and then our AP courses and our college courses they have to hit a

0:21:55.249,0:21:59.929 threshold of being eligible. So some of those courses can also be under the 22

0:21:59.929,0:22:05.899 students in a classroom. And then we do have larger class sizes in PE classes

foundation aid. Foundation aid is the largest aid category and because of the

state's current economic situation there's been a freeze at the 19-20 rate

This number does include a

pandemic adjustment of \$618,797. You don't see a decrease in

the amount because this adjustment is

offset by money that we received from

the Federal CARES Act. The Federal CARES Act money does come with some catches

and I'll kind of review that on the next slide. The next four aids are expense-

driven aids. So the first one I'll talk about

is the public and private excess aid

which is \$847,190 and this aid is

based on the special education cost in

the 19-20 school year. The next

one is BOCES aid which is \$959,966 and this number is based on the amount of money we spent on BOCES

smaller amount than was in my

previous presentations and this was

because we had lower than expected

transportation costs because of the

shutdown. So again we didn't spend as

much money, so we're not going to get as

0:26:57.250,0:27:04.510

much money back on on transportation. The next one is building aid. \$4,595,352

and this is aid from

our capital projects.

This also this includes the aid from our

our Capital Projects that we just recently

finished. So we've finished up the final

cost report so we are able to get the

aid for next year. The other aides are in

here include computer software aid,

library aid, textbook aid, hardware aid and the high tax aid and this is all based

on enrollment. This total is \$377,042 and this you'll see a

little decrease from last year in this amount, and that's just because of lower

enrollment. Um, the final one is the Community Schools

Aid which is a \$100,000 and this is the same as it was last year.

The big change only here was the

CARES tax money that I discussed in the

previous slide, which was there to offset the pandemic adjustment can be reduced.

So

what I mean by that the final state

budget authorized the governor's budget

0:29:03.429,0:29:11.169 director to make the pandemic adjustment so he gave him the ability to make

0:29:11.169,0:29:19.179 adjustments if their estimated revenues fell below 99% or if

0:29:19.179,0:29:25.210 their distributions or what they paid for exceeded 101% of their

0:29:25.210,0:29:28.840 estimates.
So they determine whether spending

0:29:28.840,0:29:35.169 reductions are called for and would remain during four specific measurement

0:29:35.169,0:29:40.719 periods or assessment periods. The three assessment periods are April 1 -

0:29:40.719,0:29:47.590 April 30, May 1 - June 30 and July 1 - December 31. And the

0:29:47.590,0:29:54.159 governor has warned us many times that the more cuts to state aid are

0:29:54.159,0:29:59.320 coming. As of today you can notice that the first assessment period has ended

0:29:59.320,0:30:05.409 already. I have not heard anything about any adjustments he's made today but he

0:30:05.409,0:30:10.299 does have that ability to do that. So what happens if they were to make

0:30:10.299,0:30:17.049 adjustments? The budget director will make a recommendation on the adjustment but

talking about, went up by \$450,000, but a lot of that was

0:34:56.180,0:35:01.200 through BOCES so we will be getting right around 50% of that back

0:35:01.200,0:35:08.780 next year. So any questions on the budget drivers?

0:35:15.900,0:35:23.920 OK, so this is the same presentation I did last time. So first line is general

0:35:23.920,0:35:27.849 support, which is the Board of Education and district central administration, the

0:35:27.849,0:35:32.140 business administrator/finance, Human Resources, legal services, and BOCES

0:35:32.140,0:35:38.019 support. that's right around 1.2 million. Operations, which is operation of

0:35:38.019,0:35:44.499 plant and maintenance of plant and insurance. So that's basically

0:35:44.499,0:35:50.170 building and grounds. That's right around 3.3 million. Teaching

0:35:50.170,0:35:54.400 or regular school, that's principals, teachers, support personnel, professional

0:35:54.400,0:36:02.049 development, textbooks, supplies, equipment, and BOCES support. It's right around 15 million.

0:36:06.039,0:36:09.880 activities. That's programs for staff, for students

0:36:09.880,0:36:15.209 with disabilities, BOCES occupational education programs, regular

0:36:15.209,0:36:21.029 education summer programs, school library, instructional technology, guidance

0:36:21.029,0:36:27.219 services, health services, co-curricular

activities, and interscholastic sports and

0:36:27.219,0:36:32.039 athletic programs. That's at 11.4 million.

0:36:32.039,0:36:36.009 Transportation and this is for all transportation across the board,

0:36:36.009,0:36:39.670 including field trips and school and sports trips.

0:36:39.670,0:36:45.219 That's 3.1 million. The next line is employee benefits,

0:36:45.219,0:36:49.809 debt service, special education summer school. So this is the cost for

0:36:49.809,0:36:55.559 retirement, medical insurance, social security, workers comp, unemployment,

0:36:55.559,0:37:01.299 principal and interest, on our serial bonds and the district's share of support for

0:37:53.150,0:37:58.370 extracurricular, is at 20%, Transportation is at 5%,

the remaining employee benefits and debt service and specialized summer program

is at 35 %. So before I hand it

back over to Dr. Suttmeier, are there any

0:41:39.260,0:41:45.920 do with what we have. We also, in the spirit of improving, we have been looking

that our freshmen are receiving all the supports that they need because we know

0:44:53.430,0:44:58.890 dollars that we have given back to our community over the past four years, that

0:45:02.910,0:45:08.280 this budget gap but that's okay. We make the best decisions every year. We take

0:52:21.800,0:52:25.700 facing. If we think this year is difficult, next year could be that much

0:52:25.700,0:52:31.799 more difficult. So we could say that we're going to take

0:52:31.799,0:52:35.910 the 1.4 and you know I'm just using 1.4, it might be closer to 1.5 at

0:52:35.910,0:52:44.549 this point, and fill it with reserves unless there are other non-mandated

0:52:44.549,0:52:53.759 programs on that list that we can look at and you know let go of, postpone, put

0:52:53.759,0:53:00.479 off, until we can steady this ship again and make sure that we're heading in the

0:53:00.479,0:53:04.589 direction that we want to go and it's a direction of growth. This school district

0:53:04.589,0:53:08.969 has been growing its programs and growing its opportunities for students,

0:53:08.969,0:53:12.630 but this is a year where we're going to tighten our belt and this is not going

0:53:12.630,0:53:18.079 to be the first year that we do this. So I just feel that we need to proceed

this year. That over \$700,000

that we pulled out of the budget has not removed program or a

staff member that's currently on our

payroll. That was the first bucket. If we

have to go deeper, that changes. We start

letting go of programs. We start letting

go of staff. Or we lean on our reserves. LH: OK.

So next year we do more of the same. I

know next year we have three retirements.

Perhaps we don't replace those three

0:56:37.200,0:56:42.330 sports program, you start losing a lot of the things that motivate our students to

0:56:42.330,0:56:46.410 come to school. So yes that is absolutely, positively something we want to avoid.

1:03:04.190,1:03:08.060 different. We have students that are missing their PT and OT services. We're

1:03:08.060,1:03:11.810 going to have compensatory services when they come back? So these are our new

city school district with a very diverse

population, we have our challenges anyway.

Masks - we priced them out, when I say

we - across the region. One of our superintendent's priced it out for just

1:03:28.820,1:03:33.230

250 staff members. We have 400. It was so

expensive and I can't even imagine if we have to give them out to students too

have to give them out to students too.

and when we ask we're not getting

answers. We don't know if we're going to

be a mask wearing society, even for

children. Disinfecting protocols - misting

machines, fogging machines, Purell. This

used to cost under \$2. It is now \$5 and

that's in bulk for a school

district. So we know that we're going to

have to have better hygiene, washing

hands, using Purell where you cannot use

soap and water. Health assessments - do we need to have temporal thermometers,

unknowns and the challenges that it's

education - we have been funding more and more not only do costs go up but also

we're sending more students to those programs. Larger class sizes - okay, we can

do that but I don't know what the schedule looks like, and with social

distancing is that going to be a reality? One of the things when I'm reimagining

1:06:57.850,1:07:02.200 call in your gold students while the other ones are online distance learning

1:07:02.200,1:07:07.780 from home because you can't have 25 students in a classroom, so you reduce it

1:07:07.780,1:07:14.320 to 12 by having 12 on-site and 12 coming in through distance learning. This is

1:07:14.320,1:07:18.220 just me talking, this is just something that I'm thinking about as I'm told to

1:07:18.220,1:07:26.470 reimagine that would solve the problem of the dilemma of larger class sizes, but

1:07:26.470,1:07:31.960 we don't know what those answers are here tonight. Operations - We're not just

1:07:31.960,1:07:37.060 talking about teaching staff. We are much more than teaching staff. There's

1:07:37.060,1:07:42.280 operations, there's support staff, so we would have to look at all of those as
