The Hudson City School District Board of Education is pleased to announce that its meetings are now broadcast live on the school district's YouTube channel.

The next broadcast will be Tuesday, Jan. 23 at 6 p.m. **Click here** to visit YouTube and click "Live" to watch. **Click here** for the agenda; if it is not immediately available, please check again closer to the meeting time. The public also is invited to attend the meeting in person at the Hudson Senior High School library.

The decision to broadcast Board of Education meetings is in response to community requests. It's also representative of the Board of Education's commitment to transparency and partnering with the community.

"We know our community greatly cares about actions by the Board of Education, and how those discussions and decisions affect our students, faculty and families," said Superintendent Dr. Juliette Pennyman. "Families have busy schedules and work commitments, sometimes making it difficult to attend Board meetings in person. While in-person attendance is always welcome, broadcasts that are recorded and posted on YouTube provide the ability to watch online, when most convenient, at any time day or night."

Board of Education President Willette Jones said, "Broadcasting the Board's meetings is another way to engage with our community – and for our community to engage with the Board. Now, families will have the ability to watch meetings whenever most convenient, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. That's very important for families that are constantly on the go."

Public Comment segments of Board of Education meetings provide an opportunity for the community to speak to the Board. Currently, online viewers will not be able to participate. However, comments emailed to the board clerk at **gaffneyt@hudsoncsd.org** will receive a written response.

Streaming is not new to the Hudson City School District. The Board of Education broadcast its meetings online during the Covid pandemic, and Hudson Senior High School's graduation ceremonies have been streamed for three years.

HUDSON CONSIDERING FOOTBALL MERGER WITH CHATHAM

LOGISTICS EXPLAINED DURING COMMUNITY INFORMATIONAL PRESENTATION

The Hudson City School District is considering merging its football program with the Chatham Central School District, and an informational presentation for the Hudson community was held at Hudson Junior Senior High School Jan. 11.

The presentation, led by Athletic Director Shawn Briscoe, was attended by about 60 parents and students, as well as Superintendent Dr. Juliette Pennyman, Hudson Senior High School Principal Derek Reardon, Board of Education Vice President Mark DePace and Board of Education member Selha Graham.

Solutions are sought because Hudson's varsity football team prematurely ended its last two seasons because it could not sustain the minimum number of players required. Briscoe emphasized that numerous merger-related logistics still need to be worked out, and that no final decision has been made. However, he said, a merger with Chatham would provide a sufficient number of varsity players and strengthen the player pool for junior varsity and modified teams.

"The more kids we have, the more success we're going to see, the more success we'll have. There could be a lot of good that comes out of this," he told the crowd, noting that he has had numerous collaborative discussions with Chatham's athletic director.

Chatham, Briscoe said, has a sufficient number of varsity players, but has light participation in other levels of its football program. That's why Chatham is interested in a merger. "Chatham is more than just considering it as an option," he said. "They are really considering it."

Briscoe explained a range of logistics in response to more than two dozen questions from the audience:

- A merger would require approval by the Hudson and Chatham Boards of Education. Those approvals would then be reviewed and likely approved by Section 2, the league both high schools now play in. A rescindable application would have to be filed by Feb. 1.
- The goal would be to have 30 players from 11th and 12th grades on a merged varsity team.
- Any merger would be a one-year renewable agreement.
- Having varsity, junior varsity and modified teams after a merger would ensure that student-athletes compete on developmentally appropriate levels. For instance, Briscoe said, younger players in 10th grade would not play against seniors, who are more physically mature. And, he said, some younger players have been understandably reluctant to play vs. seniors.

If the merger occurs, the team would alternate practice sites, share home games and each school would retain its own Homecoming game and celebration. Transportation would be provided by the school districts, and the same number of coaches in both school districts would be retained. Details such as uniform colors and districts' names on uniforms would be worked out in partnership.

A key component, Briscoe said, would be to cultivate a supportive environment for a merged team in both districts. "We would need to be one team, one family," he said. "We would have to make sure that as a community, we would be behind this 110%. I think we can do that as a community and as a school district. With Chatham, we can make this successful."

Briscoe also noted that 12 merged teams already compete in Section 2. These include Catskill/Cairo-Durham, Tamarac/Hoosick Falls and Watervliet/Heatley. In addition, one football team represents three schools: Rensselaer, Doane Stuart and Loudonville Christian.

As for next steps, Briscoe said he likely will develop separate surveys to gauge community and student sentiments about a merger. He also invited emailed questions and comments. He can be reached at **briscoes@hudsoncsd.org**.

HUDSON HIGH SENIOR, ALSO A MY BROTHER'S KEEPER FELLOW, SPEAKS DURING NEW YORK STATE'S 2024 MARTIN LUTHER KING JR. BROADCAST

The Hudson City School District is proud that Hudson Senior High School senior and My Brother's Keeper (MBK) fellow Dejuan Bailey was selected to speak during the 2024 New York State Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. broadcast on Jan. 8.

Bailey was one of four individuals selected for the 57-minute broadcast from a pool of 97 fellows. He is the first Hudson student to have this honor. He was interviewed on Dec. 1, 2023, about how Dr. King's four pillars of resilience, service, faith/ unity, and empowerment, as well as the MBK program, have positively influenced his life.

Chosen for his participation and attendance in Madd Truth Mastermind book-analysis sessions held weekly via Zoom, Bailey is honored to share his experiences at the state level for this momentous occasion. "I was honestly shocked," Bailey said. "Out of so many kids in New York State, I was one out of four selected. I'm so grateful."

In addition to being an MBK fellow, Bailey is a volunteer firefighter for the Greenport Fire Department and a member of the Hudson varsity boys and Columbia County Club soccer teams. He aspires to study criminal justice in college.

My Brother's Keeper is a grantfunded program that supports boys and young men of color through mentoring and positive relationships so they can reach their greatest potential. Participants work with mentors to develop their academic skills and personal relationships, explore opportunities for higher education, work toward career readiness and team-building, and make positive life choices. Hudson City School District Superintendent Dr. Juliette Pennyman was ecstatic to see Bailey's maturation as a young man, and his aspirations to advance himself and those he encounters.

"Our school district's vital partnership with My Brother's Keeper allows our students to learn the value of giving back, self-purpose, and how to expand in numerous facets of life," Dr. Pennyman said. "Dejuan Bailey is paving the way for future generations of young men of color to follow, and I couldn't be more proud and excited for him."

Hudson Senior High School Guidance Counselor and My Brother's Keeper advisor Vernon (Rocky) Payne was thrilled about Bailey's honor. He said such recognition is just one example of how Hudson students make a difference in their District and community.



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

COLONIAL TRADE JOB INTERVIEWS AT MCSES



- In Gaming Exploration, students collaborated, strategized, socialized, exercised and had lunch together over competitive and interactive games!




































MCSES GOES SLEDDING


Mrs. Nixon's AVID 7 class participated in a Sugar Scrub Maker workshop!
