### **Tech Club with Mr. Voss**



The kids can help to produce these things by doing the recording and video editing." Mr. Voss also wants to teach kids how to repair chromebooks.

As for advice Voss would give to students who are new to technology but interested in joining the club, Voss says, "When you're learning something new, you just have to spend time with it. Sometimes you're new to something and it feels overwhelming, but you just need to do it a little bit more until it starts to feel more normal or automatic to you. It's always hard in the beginning but you just have to get through that."



It was a fantastic day that brought everyone closer and created a fun day for all the students.






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Book Review: Huda F Cares? By Huda Fahmy




